Community Health Workers

Community Health Workers (CHWs) are frontline public health workers who are trusted members of and/or have an unusually close understanding of the community served.

This trusting relationship enables CHWs to serve as a liaison/link/intermediary between health/social services and the community to facilitate access to services and improve the quality and cultural competence of service delivery.

CHWs also build individual and community capacity by increasing health knowledge and self-sufficiency through a range of activities such as outreach, community education, informal counseling, social support and advocacy.



Mississippi Community Health Workers Association (MSCHWA)



Established by 12 CHWs/Allies on June 30, 2021 as a 501 (c) (3) non-profit organization.

The goals of MSCHWA are:

- Organize networks locally, regionally and statewide so CHWs would have a place where we can come together to share resources and challenges
- Meet colleagues and develop solidarity with others in the field
- Promote training and professional

The Benefit of CHWs



Reduced Emergency Department Use Fewer hospital readmissions Reduced Nursing Home placements Social Services Assistant Outreach and Enrollment Navigators Health Education Provider/Coach

Programs administered by health systems, clinics, community-based organizations, managed care organization (MCO), and government agencies



CHW Impact

Without CHWs, community members would likely...

- Show up to the clinic for unplanned visits.
- Would demand a same-day appointment because he does not feel well.
- Run out of insulin. His blood sugar will likely be over 300.
- Would refuse to go to urgent care.
- Not be Medication adherent
- Experience unmet need for support services (food assistance, transportation, legal, housing, etc.)

With CHW, community members would likely...

- Receive motivation and education for adherence to treatment
- Have transportation support, accompaniment and motivation to make regular appointments and obtain lab work
- Receive motivation, support and care coordination to obtain mental health and substance use services
- Be provided support for finding more stable housing
- Support participants in starting productive relationships with clinic's support staff
- Get referrals from CHWs to nearby services with whom clinic can build long term relationships
- Hopefully have better health outcomes

Next Steps?

Several key discussions on the state level need to be in place:

- Policy Change
- Clear boundaries in the scope of practice between CHWs and other professions
- Establishment of standards for preventive care benefits in all health plans
- Community Health Worker State Certification

Social Drivers of Health

- Nonmedical factors influencing health outcomes Conditions in which people are born, grow, work, live, and age
- Influenced by economic policies and systems, development agendas, social norms, social policies, racism, climate change, and political systems

- Certification and renewal fees proposed




Documentation & Reimbursement
